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Allowable uses of Title I.C Funds

Funding for providing additional supplemental learning opportunities to eligible Migrant students must supplement other resources available for English learners and low-income and low-performing students. Migrant students are regular students who are entitled to all of the benefits and services received by the general student population.

Questions to consider when a district requests to use funding for personnel:

- What percentages of their salaries are paid with migrant funds?
- What are their duties and are they directly-related to serving migrant students?
- Are their duties supplemental?
- Is the activity or service tied to the Statewide Service Delivery Plan?
- Are MEP funds first being used to target the identified needs of PFS students first?
- Does the activity or service meet needs not addressed by other services or programs available?
- Is the cost to provide the activity or service reasonable and necessary?

COSTS TO ADMINISTER THE MEP

Computers (tablet or notebook computers for recruiters)
Professional library (software, books, training materials)
Professional development (hire speakers, onsite and offsite trainings)
Support recruitment activities
Certified Needs Assessment services

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

Parent resource center (provide computer access and a resource library for parents)
Training sessions (hire speakers, host parent/teacher cooperative sessions)
Education (adult education, English as a Second Language lessons, health/well-being classes)
Provide transportation and lodging for parents to attend migrant conferences/trainings
Parent Action Committee (PAC) involvement activities
Family literacy programs

STUDENT ENRICHMENT

LeapPads (to be checked out)
Notebook computers (to be checked out)
Computer lab for migrant students
iPods (useful for video and voice lessons or educational podcasts)
Migrant classroom (if space is available) to hold supplementary lessons

Travel (provide transportation for migrant students to attend supplementary instruction/summer school)

Migrant student library (educational and reading books for migrant students to check out)

Dropout intervention and reduction activities

Classroom supplies for supplementary activities/summer school

Health services for migrant students without insurance

Educational support services that provide a pathway to completion of a high school diploma or equivalent for out-of-school youth

Expand early childhood services to include three-year-old migrant children
