


Overall Results


- In 2015, the average score of fourth-grade students in Missouri was 223. This was not significantly different from the average score of 221 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Missouri in 2015 (223) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (222) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (216).
- The percentage of students in Missouri who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 36 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (35 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (28 percent).
- The percentage of students in Missouri who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 70 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (70 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (61 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions



In 2015, the average score in Missouri (223) was

- light blue: lower than those in 13 states/jurisdictions
- dark blue: higher than those in 16 states/jurisdictions
- lightest blue: not significantly different from those in 22 states/jurisdictions



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (33 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 20 points lower than that for White students. Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 1998, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2015, female students in Missouri had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 7 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 24 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
