

How to Cite Images in a Works Cited

Images or pictures that you decide to use in a presentation or research paper must be cited. Only those that are obtained from royalty free clip art, such as the clip art available in Microsoft Word or Powerpoint do not need citing. Any items obtained from the web or scanned from a print source should be attributed to the owner to the copyrighted work.

Include as many of the following as you can (*in the following order*) in your citation:

- Artist's Name (Surname First), if known
- "Title" (if provided) or Brief Description or File Name (jpg or gif) if electronically accessed
- Author of article or book or web site (if applicable)
- *Title* of "article" or book or *web site home page* (if applicable)
- *Title*, volume number, issue number and date of *magazine* (if applicable)
- *Database name* (if applicable)
- URL of image (or of web site if image jpg not available) (if applicable)
- Date of access if online or publication date if originally from print material
- Page numbers for image taken from a book, magazine, newspaper article. etc. If pictures are inserted between pages of text in a non-fiction book and page numbers do not appear with pictures, merely record "see photograph insert(s) after page x."
